### **Collection Summary**

**Title:** Hume-Fogg High School Collection

**Inclusive Dates:** 1897-2011, (bulk 1900-1947)

**Summary/Abstract:** This artificially assembled collection documents Hume-Fogg High School and its students, faculty, and alumni, and to some degree, the Nashville public school system, throughout most of the twentieth century, with small portions from the late 1890's and first decade of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Materials include graduation programs, publications, class photographs, scrapbooks, school master schedules, a War Production Training manual used during World War II, and a wide variety of other items.

### **Biographical/Historical Sketch**

The site of present-day (2011) Hume-Fogg High School was occupied by Nashville's first public school, the Hume School, opening on February 26, 1855. The school was named for Alfred Hume, a prominent local educator who worked to organize Nashville's first public school system. In 1875 a separate building, Fogg School, was erected on the property. It was named for Francis B. Fogg, then president of the board of education. Classes during 1910 to 1912 were held at Murphy Grammar School while the current building was under construction. In 1912, the new Hume-Fogg High School building opened, replacing both the Hume and Fogg buildings, which had been razed.

From its beginning, Hume-Fogg followed the classic school curriculum with Latin, English, science, and mathematics. In 1919, it was the first school in Tennessee to be accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The school taught ninth through twelfth grades until 1924 when ninth-graders began attending local junior high schools. In the fall of 1940, the school included technical and vocational classes and became Hume-Fogg Technical and Vocational High School and later Hume-Fogg Comprehensive High School. During World War II, industrial training programs for adults were held at the school. Beginning in 1983, Hume-Fogg became an academic magnet school, using an intensive college preparatory curriculum, and its name was changed to Hume-Fogg Academic High School.

In 1974, the building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Principals for the school have included: C.T. Kirkpatrick (1914-1940); J. Howard Cochran (1942-1966); A. D. Hancock (1967-1977); John D. Roper (1978-1980); and others.

### **Scope and Contents of the Collection**

This collection documents Hume-Fogg High School and its students, faculty, and alumni, and to some degree, the Nashville public school system. The collection begins in the late 1890s and continues through 2011, with the bulk of the material from 1900 to 1947. Formats include programs, invitations, news clippings, publications, class and candid photographs, student and faculty scrapbooks, course schedules, student handbooks,

school administrative materials, alumni reunion materials and reminiscences, and a wide variety of other items. Graduates who went on to gain some fame as adults include: Fanny Rose Shore (Dinah Shore); Randall Jarrell; Delbert Mann; and Bettie (Betty) Page. There is also a small group of materials from the 1930s and 1940s from Community Playhouse, whose performances often included Hume-Fogg High School students in the cast.

Some items were donated to the Nashville Public Library from various individuals through the years; most of these items were originally housed in the Schools Ephemera Subject Files. In 2011, during the processing of the materials donated from the school, it was determined to remove all Hume-Fogg materials from the Ephemera Subject Files and incorporate them into this collection.

## **Detailed Description of the Collection**

### **Series I. Students, 1897-1992, (bulk 1930-1939)**

**Series Abstract/Description:** The series contains commencement programs 1900-1987 (Fogg School and Hume-Fogg School); clippings; programs, minutes, and related materials from student clubs; programs, photographs, and other items relating to sports; student publications (1912-1980); and scrapbooks. Scrapbook contents often overlap with other subject areas.

Commencement programs range from 1900 (Fogg School) to the late 1980s. These contain graduating students' names, along with those receiving various academic honors. A number of the programs have hand-written annotations, and for this reason, more than one copy of a program may have been retained. Material related to student clubs (Drama, Quill, and Shakespeare), mostly in the early 1900s, includes programs, clippings, member rosters and club record books, invitations, and photographs. Student publications include *The Echo*, *The Tattler*, *Tech Times*, and the *Devil's Tales*. There are a few items relating to sports, other school programs, research files about Randall Jarrell, and a few other miscellaneous items. Some students who gained fame as adults include: Dinah Shore (Fanny Rose Shore), Randall Jarrell, Delbert Mann and Bettie (Betty) Page. There are numerous formal class photographs of some graduating classes, along with some candid pictures. Several student scrapbooks document student and school activities in the 1910s, 1920s, and 1970s.

## **Series II. Faculty & Administration 1912-1993**

**Series Abstract/Description:** This series includes: school profiles; handbooks for students; school-wide awards and recognitions; admissions information; and other materials. A composition handbook from the late 1920s was written by two Hume-Fogg faculty members, Mary Louise Goodwin and Kate Gordon Guill. One very large scrapbook contains a program from the school's opening ceremonies in 1913, but the bulk is from the decade of the 1930s. Probably compiled by the school library, it contains clippings, photographs (most identified) and programs. A wide variety of subjects are included, with emphasis on library staff and students; sports; and the Dramatic Club. Four other scrapbooks from 1940-1942 document school system retreats held for faculty at Monteagle, Montgomery Bell State Park, and at the Knapp Farm in Nashville, owned by Peabody College. A War Production Training Manual from 1943 shows a time when Hume-Fogg Technical and Vocational High School was part of a national program to train people for industrial war work. Students in the program ranged in age from 17 to 71. Subjects at this specialized school included training in sheet metal and aircraft riveting and assembly, skills which would be useful at Nashville's Avco (Vultee) plant. Also included in this series are master schedules of classes for Hume-Fogg High School, from 1912 to 1940, showing the various subjects taught at the school, over time.

#### **Series IV. Nashville School System 1913-1987**

**Series Abstract/Description:** Materials include a 1947 Statement of Educational Philosophy booklet (Nashville Public Schools), an Orientation of New Teachers 1963-1964 (Nashville City Schools, prior to Metro consolidation), and Metro Schools Honors Roundup, 1987. Of special note are thousands of receipts documenting area schoolchildren's donations to construct a memorial to Alfred Hume. These receipts were placed in a sealed copper box inside the memorial in 1913, and removed when they were discovered in 1959. Receipts are grouped by school and show the names and amount contributed by each child, usually in the range of 1 to 10 cents. Also recovered from the Hume memorial is a Bible donated to the school by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### **Series V. Community Playhouse 1935-1945**

**Series Abstract/Description:** Publications and programs from Community Playhouse, 1935-1945. This series contains eleven issues of the publication "Offstage Noise," 1935-1938. Usually running about ten pages, these include information about the organization, and information about current and upcoming productions. The newsletters also contain biographical information about members of the cast and crew, as well as sponsor ads for local businesses. A list of "affiliated organizations" is frequently included, containing the names of numerous area schools, including Hume-Fogg, as well as other groups.

Another publication of the Community Playhouse is a 1945 booklet, *2<sup>nd</sup> Decade of the Playhouse*. Of particular interest in this publication is a year-by-year listing of the plays produced from 1935 to 1945 (the organization's first ten seasons), along with the top ten attendance figures for the first decade. Also included are: the governing rules for the organization; guidelines for student membership;

information about the Nashville Children's Theater; a brief financial report; and a list of all the artist members and the board of directors (as of 1945).

This series also contains 17 programs for productions from 1939 to 1945, including two for the Junior League Children's Theatre, whose performances were held at the Community Play House.
