Summary/Abstract: Over 100 audio-recorded interviews of individuals recalling their experiences at Union Station as travelers, railroad or station employees, relatives of employees, or in other capacities. Recollections span the time frame from the construction and dedication of the station in the late 1890s to the time of the interviews in the mid-1970s. The interviews were used in 1977 in the writing of a book: *Speaking of Union Station*.

Biographical/Historical Sketch

Union Station opened on October 9, 1900 to serve as Nashville's main passenger and freight terminal for the Louisville and Nashville Railroad (L&N) and the Nashville, Chattanooga, and St. Louis (N.C. & St. L.). It served Nashville's transportation needs until the 1950s, when rail travel began to be superseded by the automobile and aviation, but portions of it remained in service as a passenger terminal until 1979. By the time passenger service ceased, the station had already fallen into grave disrepair, and was shut down for code violations in 1975. The building had been placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1969, and received National Historic Landmark status in 1975, but this status was revoked in 2003 due to the demolition of the historic Train Shed in 2001. In 1986, intensive restoration and renovation work began, and on December 31, Union Station reopened as a hotel. In 1997 the Mercury statue was replaced on top of the building, after the original had plummeted to the ground in 1952.

The efforts of Historic Nashville, Inc. (HNI), beginning in 1975, were instrumental in the salvation and restoration of this important structure. As part of this effort, the Junior League undertook a major oral history project in 1976-1977, resulting in the publication of *Speaking of Union Station*. The book was based on the oral histories, and proceeds from its sale went to the Union Station Trust Fund.

Scope and Contents of the Collection

This collection includes 112 audio-recorded interviews done by Junior League of Nashville volunteers. Although the interviews were conducted in 1976 and 1977, the time period of the recollections are from the 1890s until the early-1970s. Each interview has an index and in a few cases, a transcript. A few written reminiscences are also included in the collection. About twenty newspaper abstracts created by Fletch Coke, spanning the period from 1898 to 1952, and probably created as a background resource for interviewers on important events at Union Station, are also included, filed at the back of the collection.

Interviews concern such varied topics as the construction and dedication of Union Station; the old railroad station in use prior to Union Station (located in the vicinity of Church Street and 10th Avenue); the physical and architectural details of Union Station, including the alligator pools and the Mercury statue, among other features; various details about travelling by rail; and the overall hustle and bustle of a busy urban railway station.

Other topics include troop trains, parades, and bond drives during World War I and World War II; baggage and luggage; dining facilities at the station and on railroad cars; Pullman cars and Pullman porters (also known as "Red Caps"); freight and mail operations; train wrecks, including the notorious 1918 disaster at Dutchman's Curve, the worst train accident in American history; dramatic weather events, especially the blizzard of 1951; circus trains; holidays, especially Christmas; vacations and trips to locations elsewhere in Tennessee as well as New York, Florida, and elsewhere; weddings and

honeymoons; university students arriving in Nashville via train; operations of canteens, Red Cross and USO activities during wartime; famous visitors or travelers, such as Franklin Delano Roosevelt (FDR), Teddy Roosevelt, Mae West, Speaker of the House Jo Byrn's funeral, and Al Capone. A few interviewees are relatives of Maj. Eugene C. Lewis, the building's designer or Major John Thomas, president of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad. Both men had also been the ranking officials of the Tennessee Centennial Exposition of 1897.

Employees and their roles range from individuals who worked in the station selling tickets, handling baggage or mail, telegraph operators, or other activities, to those who "rode the rails" as engineers, firemen, porters, conductors, brakemen, and others; and individuals who worked in the shops and yards, such as laborers, dispatchers, roundhouse workers and so forth. Also mentioned occasionally is the New Shops (in West Nashville) as well as Radnor Yards.

Union Station served the Nashville Chattanooga and St. Louis (NC & St. L) line, as well as the Louisville and Nashville (L& N), so interviews often discuss a particular railroad line for which an individual worked. Specific individuals may briefly mention labor unions and strikes, although these are not prominent topics in this collection. Likewise, segregation in facilities and jobs is mentioned in a few interviews, but is not a prominent topic in the overall collection. A few specific passenger trains are occasionally mentioned, especially the "Dixie Flyer" and the "Pan American".

Some interviews mention briefly: the Tennessee Centennial Exposition; presidential visits; Ward Seminary and the women who participated in the station's dedication ceremonies; Vanderbilt University; railroad employee picnics; deaths and injuries; German prisoners-of-war during World War II; the Great Depression; the 1918 influenza epidemic; and the Old Hickory Powder Plant.

About twenty newspaper abstracts created by Fletch Coke, spanning the period from 1898 to 1952, and probably created as a background resource for interviewers on important events at Union Station, are filed at the back of the collection.
